SECTION 5 – CONTROL MEASURES

If a member of staff or student develops symptoms during the working day the following actions are to be taken:

The person displaying symptoms

- Staff/student is moved to isolation room (at present the portacabin, the management team will allocate further areas if multiple cases)
- Supervision in full PPE
- Parent is contacted and student taken home – parent to transport.
- Person isolates for 10 days

Staff and students from symptomatic persons bubble

- Stay in current work area maintaining social distancing
- Arrangements made for students and then staff to go home
- Work area fully cleaned and closed if possible, for 72 hours
- Staff and students self-isolate for 10 days.

Clinically extremely vulnerable:

In Tier 1: Medium alert and Tier 2: High alert:

- clinically extremely vulnerable individuals are advised to work from home where possible but can still attend work/attend the farm if they cannot work from home.

In Tier 3: Very High alert:

- clinically extremely vulnerable individuals are strongly advised to work from home but can still attend work/farm if they cannot work from home. The management team should consider whether clinically extremely vulnerable individuals can take on an alternative role or change their working patterns temporarily to avoid travelling during busy periods.

In Tier 4: Stay at Home:

- clinically extremely vulnerable individuals are strongly advised to work from home/attend the farm. If you cannot work from home, then you should not attend work/farm. The management team should consider whether clinically extremely vulnerable individuals can take an alternative role, or change their working patterns temporarily to enable them to work from home. Where that is not possible, the management team will not require individuals to attend work/farm, but have a conversation about alternative arrangements including a consideration of the use of the [Coronavirus Job Retention Scheme \(furlough\)](#).

Footfall:

- Only students with placements are to attend the farm at present
- Those who can work from home should work from home.
- Volunteers can attend the farm when the farm is in tier one or two

- Arrival and departure from the farm of Staff and students is to be staggered to reduce crowding at the main entry and exit points to the farm.
- Students are to be greeted in the car park and brought through by a member of staff via the hay barn gates which are to be closed and straight into the yard to reduce footfall to the main entrance.

Social Distancing:

- Only work in small groups called bubbles and always try to keep 2 metres apart in your bubble and 2 metres away from each bubble.
- Avoid shaking hands and hugging.
- Work outside when possible.
- Stagger breaks so minimizes the number of staff and students in the classroom or common areas at one time.
- Rearrange tables so that social distancing is achieved, 2 persons to a bench.
- Only two people at a time in an office, see safe working for offices.
- Only two persons in the staff room, see safe working for staff rooms.
- Only one person in the Kitchen, see safe working for the kitchen.
- Floor markings on the floor to show 2 metre distancing.
- PPE available when social distancing cannot be maintained.

Hygiene/Infection Control:

- Washing stations will be increased for hand washing, each will include soap, sanitiser and disposable towels.
- Paper towels provided rather than communal hand towels.
- Staff and students are to wash their hands-on arrival at the farm and frequently throughout the day for a period of 20 seconds each time.
- There may be a requirement for some of our students to be seen to wash their hands.
- Do not allow students to touch any part of their face with their hands before hands are washed.
- Toilets are to be wiped down before and after use.
- All are encouraged to catch coughs and sneezes with disposable tissues then throw used tissues away and then wash hands, if you don't have a tissue then use your sleeve.
- Touch surfaces (doors and door handles, tabletop, taps, fridge, laptops computer keyboards, toilet flush etc) are to be cleaned twice in the morning and then again in the afternoon.
- Doors where possible are to be wedged opened to avoid touching doors and door handles.
- Nitrile Gloves are available for those who wish to use them.
- Own cup/mugs are to be used and individuals are to make their own tea/coffee.
- Only disposable towel is to be used in the kitchen.
- Foodstuffs stored carefully to prevent contamination and infestation.
- Individuals are to prepare their own foods.
- The contracted cleaner will clean all touch surfaces at the end of each working day.

PPE:

- Protective clothing is to be worn:
 - Gloves.
 - Boots.
 - Coveralls.
 - Face mask are to be worn if social distancing cannot be achieved.
 - Face shields are to be worn by staff if social distancing cannot be achieved.
 - When dealing with an individual who requires first aid attention, face mask, face shields and gloves must be worn
 - Face coverings are to be worn by all those on site in communal areas unless exempt.

Body Temperature:

Each day the body temperature of all individuals who attend the farm is to be taken by using a non-contact forehead thermometer, if a reading is 37.5 centigrade and below no action is to be taken, 37.5 but below 38 centigrade they are to be monitored, if they are 38 centigrade then the individual is to be

isolated and the temperature retaken after 10 minutes if the reading is still 38 centigrade then the following procedure is to be followed:

- Staff/student is moved to isolation room (at present the portacabin, the management team will allocate further areas if multiple cases)
- Supervision in full PPE
- Parent is contacted and student taken home – parent to transport.
- Get a test to check if you have coronavirus as soon as possible
- Stay at home and do not have visitors until you get your test result – only leave your home to have the test.
- Anyone you live with, and anyone in your support bubble, must also stay at home until you get your results.

Tools:

- Only tools suitable for the task are to be used.
- The students are to be trained in the use of the tools required for the task.
- All tools are to be serviceable.
- All tool handles are to be wiped down with sanitiser before and after use.
- Where possible tools are to be allocated to each individual

Foreign travel:

- Do not travel unless imperative.
- Where an individual has recently visited high risk countries (see government guidelines), they should self/home isolate themselves for 10 days.

Main Symptoms and advice of COVID-19:

Stay at home if you have either:

- **A high temperature** – this means you feel hot to touch on your chest or back (you do not need to measure your temperature)
- **A new, continuous cough** – this means coughing a lot for more than an hour, or 3 or more coughing episodes in 24 hours (if you usually have a cough, it may be worse than usual)
- **A loss or change to your sense of smell or taste** – this means you've noticed you cannot smell or taste anything, or things smell or taste different to normal.

Most people with coronavirus have at least one of these symptoms.

If you have any of the main symptoms of coronavirus:

- Do not attend the farm.
- Get a test to check if you have coronavirus as soon as possible
- Stay at home and do not have visitors until you get your test result – only leave your home to have the test.
- Anyone you live with, and anyone in your support bubble, must also stay at home until you get your results.

If you have been advised that you must self-isolate:

- Do not attend the farm.
- Get a test to check if you have coronavirus as soon as possible.
- If the test is positive you are to inform the farm so that those in your support can be informed to self-isolate and get a test.
